The meeting was called to order at 1:30 p.m.

Assessor

1. First Reading; Budget Revision: Vehicle Replacement

Tom Schauwecker explained his office has a 2013 Ford Explorer with a power transfer unit that is leaking. This part is critical to making the rear wheels operate. The estimated cost to repair it is \$1,924.91. The vehicle also requires four new tires which would cost \$560. The estimated value of the vehicle is \$2,600. So, he would like to dispose of it and replace it with a new vehicle. Some funds will be moved from personnel; however, there are plenty of funds in the Assessment Fund which stands separate from General Revenue.

There were no comments or questions from the Commission.

Commissioner Atwill stated this is a first reading and requested the Deputy County Clerk to

schedule this item for a second reading at the next available commission meeting with appropriate order for approval.

2. First & Second Reading; Bond Approval: Collector Brian McCollum

Angela Wehmeyer explained that per Missouri Statute, the Collector is required to have a surety bond for no more than \$750,000. This bond needs to be in place by the time the Collector is sworn in for the next term.

Commissioner Parry moved now on this day, the County Commission of the County of Boone does hereby approve the Bond of the Collector for the Missouri Department of Revenue in the maximum sum of seven hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$750,000).

4. First Reading; Landlord Subordination Agreement: Aurora Organic Dairy

6. First & Second Reading; Release Letter of Credit: Abell Label, LLC

Thaddeus Yonke read the following staff report:

The plat of Abell Acres was received and accepted by the County Commission on February 16, 2018. On that date, the Commission also accepted a letter of credit as surety for completion of sanitary sewer infrastructure that is necessary to comply with the Subdivision Regulations.

By letter dated February 5, 2019, Boone County Regional Sewer District has stated that the improvements have been accepted by the Board of Trustees and that the District does not oppose release of the letter of credit. If approved, the remaining available balance will be \$0.00.

There were no comments or questions from the Commission.

Commissioner Parry moved now on this day, the County Commission of the County of

Boone does hereby release the Boone County Central Bank Letter of Credit Number 0579177-0099, in favor of Boone County, Missouri on behalf of Abell Label, LLC, in the amount of \$21,378.25.

7. Public Hearing & Second Reading; Budget Amendment: County to Act as Lead on Intergovernmental Agreement for Macroinvertebrate Project (1st read 1-29-19)

Commissioner Atwill opened the public hearing.

Ken Midkiff was present to speak on the item.

Midkiff, who is Chair of the Environment and Energy Commission of the City of Columbia and Boone County, asked that this item be tabled until the meeting on February 19th, so he would be able to look at data from the Department of Natural Resources regarding macroinvertebrate population.

Commissioner Parry explained the County Staff has indicated that the contractors for this project are going to review the existing data and analyze it using different metrics than what the Department of Natural Resources uses.

Midkiff said he did not know whether it was data level three or four, or if it was a water quality sampling of the DNR data itself.

Commissioner Parry wanted clarification that Midkiff just wanted this item postponed until he had a chance to look at the data.

Midkiff said yes.

Commissioner Parry asked Lynne Hooper if that data would be available for them to review.

Midkiff said he already had the data in an Excel file and from briefly looking at it, it seems that Hinkson Creek is getting worse.

Commissioner Parry asked if the people studying this data could give the County that information and if they would come to the same conclusion.

Midkiff said he had no idea.

Commissioner Parry asked County Staff for their input.

Hooper said it seems as though Mr. Midkiff is wanting to review the most recent DNR data to determine whether the condition of the stream is improving or not. She is not sure if that would be relevant to consideration of moving forward with the contract being proposed. The study that is being prepared for is having an independent contractor review all of the DNR data to see if using different metrics than what DNR uses could show more information about what is causing the impairment in Hinkson Creek without incurring a cost to collect additional data.

Midkiff asked if they would be studying the E Coli data as well.

Hooper said no. The E Coli data are not part of the Hinkson Creek Collaborative Adaptive Management process.

Stan Shawver asked what period the data mining will be looking at.

Hooper said it should cover all of the data that have been collected over the course of years since Hinkson Creek was put on the 303 D list. DNR has a very specific metric to determine whether the macroinvertebrate community is what it should be. What has been proposed is to look at the data from a different angle using different metrics to see if that might point out some species that are missing that should be present, if those species are intolerant to certain pollutions, etc., to try and get a better understanding of what is going on based on the data that is already there.

Commissioner Parry asked what impact delaying this item until next week would have on awarding the contract or studying the data.

Hooper said she didn't think it would have much of an impact.

Commissioner Parry asked if there would be any objection by Staff on tabling this item until next week.

Hooper said no.

Commissioner Thompson said she would support Mr. Midkiff's request to table this item until next week.

There were no more comments or questions from the Commission.

This item was tabled until the February 19, 2019 meeting.
