12. First Reading; Resolution & Contingency Fee Agreement authorizing the filing of

# federal litigation to obtain an appropriate recovery for Boone County relating to the current opioid epidemic

CJ Dykhouse explained this is a resolution and contingency fee agreement that would bring Boone County in along with a lot of other local governments around the country into the multi-district litigation that is pending in the northern district of Ohio. The County has interviewed three different sets of attorney groups that have different theories on how to approach the opioid epidemic and the impact that it has had on different communities. The group chosen and the theories of recovery they have articulated are the most persuasive. Scott Clardy from the Health Department is present to speak on the opioid epidemic in Missouri and Boone County.

Scott Clardy said in 2017, the latest year there is good data for, there were 111 hospitalizations for opioid misuse, and that is 111 Boone County residents. There were likely more than that in Boone County, but that is just the number for the residents. The peak year for that was 2015, in which there were 203 hospitalizations. As far as heroin hospitalizations, there were 12 in 2017, with the peak year being 2016 with 14. Looking at emergency room visits, in 2017 for opioids, there were 139 visits. The peak year for this was 2014, with 181. Regarding heroin and emergency room visits, there were 29 in 2017. 2017 was the peak year for heroin related emergency room visits. In 2016, there were 23 heroin related emergency room visits. Looking at overdose deaths for opioids, in 2017 there were 16. That is the highest there has been. In 2016, there were 12 deaths related to opioids. While there seem to be less hospitalizations and less emergency room visits, there is an increase in deaths. Looking at just heroin, there were less than 5 deaths in 2017. If the true number is less than 5, it is suppressed to make sure confidentiality is not being compromised, but it was less than 5. In 2015, which was the peak year, there were 5 deaths. In 2012 to 2016, there were a total of 17 deaths due to heroin.

Looking at these numbers, the story being told is that, from a hospitalization and emergency

room standpoint, much like the rest of the state and country, there was a peak one to three years ago with a decline now, but there is still an uptick in deaths. It is also important to remember this is just hospitalizations and emergency room data; this doesn't count all the other people who don't make it to the hospital or emergency room.

Commissioner Atwill asked what the connection between the opioid problem and heroin is.

Clardy explained heroin is an opioid. What happens, generally, is people would get a prescription opioid for legitimate reasons and get hooked. Once they are hooked and no longer able to get the prescription drug, they then would go to the streets and get heroin which is cheaper and available.

Commissioner Parry asked for information about the use of NARCAN.

Clardy there is a project out of UMSL called the No Hope Project that is providing NARCAN for people who have been properly trained on it. Therefore, the Health Department here has provided training throughout Columbia to different organizations where they might see someone with an overdose. There is NARCAN at the Health Department in case an issue occurs there. MUPD, Columbia Fire, and the Columbia Police Department have it should they need it. If any other police department in the County has it, he is not aware, and it would not be through that same project.

Dykhouse said the Boone County Jail participates in the project as well.

Commissioner Atwill said yesterday, the Assistant Attorney General for the State of Missouri pointed out that the State of Missouri has filed opioid litigation, also pointing out that the Counties are separate from that. So, this is appropriate in that sense because, without bringing separate action, the State would not cover the County's interests. Recently there was a settlement between the state of Oklahoma and the opioid defendants for over 200

million dollars. The damages in that are hard to calculate, but apparently, they managed to get through that in that case. This is very appropriate, and the Commission looks forward to proceeding as needed.

Commissioner Parry asked if it was possible to get a count of how many times NARCAN has been administered. He is curious how many times it has been used by these agencies to prevent death since there has been an increase in deaths.

Clardy said yes, he could get that information.

Dykhouse said this fee agreement requires no tax payer dollars to pay this group of attorneys. There is no expectation of reimbursement of litigation expenses if there is no recovery.

There were no more comments or questions from the Commission.

Commissioner Atwill stated this is a first reading and requested the Deputy County Clerk to schedule this item for a second reading at the next available commission meeting with appropriate order for approval.
