Commissioner Parry said this is a national organization and Susan Haines is the driving force behind it. Exercise Tiger was an event in history that most people did not learn about in school, but it really is an amazing story. The national monument for Exercise Tiger is located in Mexico, Missouri.

Commissioner Thompson said, had Exercise Tiger not happened, the invasion of Normandy on D-Day would not have turned out the way it did. The sacrifice those people made really did make all the difference in the world.

Commissioner Atwill said more men from Missouri lost lives during this operation than any other state, with the most coming from Audrain County. 201 soldiers from the State of Missouri lost their lives in an hour with one being from Boone County and six from Audrain County.

Susan Haines said, in the group's efforts over the years, they have gotten Highway 54 renamed to Exercise Tiger Express and it is an honor to be able to recognize all the people that sacrificed their lives that way.

14. Public Comment

Win Grace, Pam Haverland, and Barb Elmore were present to speak on behalf of Ginlet Neighbors for Broadband.

Haverland thanked Commissioner Parry for hosting the summit earlier that day. It was great to have the representatives from the internet companies and elected officials all together to discuss this issue.

Grace presented a letter to the Commissioners. That letter is included at the end of these minutes.

Grace told the Commissioners that Socket will be coming out to their neighborhood to take a look at what they might be able to do for them. They are not giving any big promises, but this a good start to getting better internet out there. They will keep their feet to the fire to make progress on this. They are concerned as there are some people who do not have any service. It is also concerning that federal dollars have been given to these companies to provide service and they are not seeing anything.

Commissioner Parry said the process used to judge where coverage is can be deceptive. If one house in a census tract shows up as having at least 10 megabytes download and 1 megabyte upload, then that covers the entire census tract. According the FCC, that entire census tract is served with internet. So, it is very misleading. Senator Blunt is now aware of the situation and is working to change the way they map and report things.

Haverland said she gets absolutely nothing at her house. But, with Commissioner Parry holding this meeting this morning, she is hopeful that it has put the providers on notice that the elected officials are watching them and it would be a good idea to let those providers know elected officials will be meeting again next year and asking about their progress on this matter.

Commissioner Thompson said part of the problem that needs to be fixed is not letting those providers be the ones that write those reports that show who has service. Commissioner Parry said the current system is a broken system and it is not an adequate way to test service and he is hopeful for change.

15. Commission Reports

Commissioner Parry said there was a great turnout for the internet summit this morning with elected officials, almost every provider in the market, concerned neighbors, and policy makers. Everyone learned a lot. The providers were very honest with the audience which is great. The Governor just released \$5 million for some projects which is really just a drop in a bucket for broadband, but the providers were able to tell Senator Rowden and Representative Kendrick that the plan had many faults.

The meeting adjourned at 2:03 p.m.



Dear Commissioners Atwill, Parry and Thompson,

On behalf of Ginlet area Eastern Boone County residents within the 65201 zip code (including Hwy AB, Barnes Chapel, N. Millsite, Ginn, Ginlet, and Monterra Place Roads), and after ~15 years of mostly unsuccessful attempts, we would like to ask your assistance with securing broadband Internet service to *all* residents in our rapidly developing, but overlooked, portion of Boone County.

Historically, as a group, we have expended considerable efforts and resources to gain high speed/broadband Internet service. We have contacted local, state, & national Internet service providers, including:

- phone companies (GTE, Verizon, CenturyTel, and CenturyLink);
- cell phone companies (AT&T, Sprint, US Cellular, Verizon, T-Mobile);
- cable companies (MediaCom, Charter, ComCast);
- Internet Service Providers (Tranguility 4G/WIMAX, Socket, Verizon MiFi); and
- companies who "bundle" Internet access with existing services.

Most residents in this area are limited to satellite Internet access, which is insufficient to the needs of all residents in our group. Even so, we are paying exorbitant rates for installation and monthly capped/limited bandwidth service through HughesNet or Boone Electric Cooperative (Viasat). One property owner offered land for a tower location, which was ultimately rejected.

As hardworking Missourians, and as taxpayers, contributors, and citizens of Boone County, we are committed to making high speed/broadband access a reality. We are willing to undertake whatever efforts are necessary, whether such effort consists of working with a legal or state agency, an outside consulting firm that could help persuade or incentivize Internet service providers, or taking our efforts to a more public forum. We are dedicated to this so that we can finally and equally participate as professionals in today's economic, cultural, social, political, and educational life in the same manner as the rest of Boone County.

In today's world, lack of broadband Internet service holds negative consequences for anyone individually, as well as everyone collectively. The ability to download large files quickly and seamlessly is urgent for professionals, business entrepreneurs, students, and engaged individuals in our group, specifically:

- Physicians needing to immediately view patient files to better treat and save lives;
- Teachers needing to teach and students needing to learn;
- Employers/Business owners needing to be in constant contact with employees, suppliers, and customers;
- Telecommuting professionals needing to create/view/distribute essential job-related files;
- Families needing to communicate with their family members living outside this neighborhood;
- Farmers needing to conduct business and stay current with crop research, prices, precision farming;
- A professional musician needing to prepare for rehearsals with other musicians;
- Investors needing to have up-to-second timing for investment decisions;
- Retirees needing to connect with information, recreation, and health care;
- Healthcare needs-Patients needing access to records, medical providers, emergency and online services;
- Lifeline cameras for independent living.
- Everyone who wants to use on-line banking and on-line bill pay.
- Safety and security! Calling 911 with emergencies. On-line security measures for the home. Cell phone coverage is spotty, calls are often dropped. CenturyLink landlines are unreliable.

Obviously, the three of you are already aware of this need, and we deeply appreciate that! Your cooperation and help will be greatly appreciated.
