Proclamation

1. Proclamation Recognizing the Woodruff-Hickman High School Student Bicentennial Collaboration

Commissioner Thompson explained this is an exciting collaboration that was made possible by Rhonda Proctor, a member of the Bicentennial Committee, who, in her capacity as a member of the staff at Boone Electric Cooperative, had occasion to work with students before on advertising and marketing projects. Looking at what could be done for the Bicentennial, Proctor immediately thought of Hickman High School. With that, work began on a Bicentennial advertising and marketing project. The other piece of this project was the folks from Woodruff, which is an international marketing and advertising company based in Columbia. The Bicentennial Committee was very fortunate that Shannan Baker-Kenny and Scott Shade and their team were willing to give their time to the students at Hickman High School for this project. Commissioner Thompson thanked Baker-Kenny and Shade for their amazing gift to the students and their future.

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The students came up with a wonderful idea that combines the history of the County and took it to the next level with the help of these great professionals at Woodruff called All Trails Lead Home. There is a great picture that helps to illustrate and tie the County's history with the Booneslick Trail and the Bicentennial celebration.

Scott Fuenfhausen said, speaking on behalf of the Columbia Career Center and Hickman High School, they really appreciated the opportunity that was given to the students. It really gave the students a chance to show what they know, and they did a fantastic job. However, it was not expected that Woodruff would so generously give the students the opportunity to work on that with them and get real professional experience, which cannot be substituted in a classroom. That opportunity was invaluable and really got the students ready for their next step.

Scott Shade thanked Fuenfhausen for his kind words and wanted to commend him as well for his work with the students and the students as well. They did a great job. This was very much a collaborative effort. Some great work was presented that not only the students can be proud of, but Boone County residents as well.

Whereas, Shannan, Scott and their team imparted professional guidance and mentoring as they collaborated with the students of the 2018-2019 Advertising & Promotions class, as well as the Hickman High School students of the 2019-2020 Sports & Entertainment Marketing class, who utilized their time with the professionals at Woodruff during meetings and internships to learn what it takes to create a targeted and holistic promotional campaign in a real-world situation; and

Whereas, "All Trails Lead Home," the logo and tagline developed through this collaboration, captures the pioneering and communitybased spirit of Boone County and will be featured on Bicentennial marketing items sold throughout 2020, the proceeds from which will assist a COVID-19 relief project focused on and determined by the school districts within Boone County; and *Whereas*, these students have each chosen to continue their education, pursuing various fields of study, at the University of Missouri, which, along with the communities in which these students ultimately work and live, will benefit from the enthusiasm and creativity these students exhibited through this collaboration.

6. First Reading; Approval of Proposal for Consultant Services: Engineering Surveys
& Services

Bill Florea explained this was a request for consultant services with Engineering Surveys & Services to conduct concrete compression strength and aggregate testing associated with the construction of public streets in the Perche Ridge Plat 1. The expenses are not to exceed \$7,100.

Commissioner Parry asked for clarification on what was being tested.

Florea explained that, as they pour the concrete, they will take samples of it and let it harden and test the strength. They also sift the aggregate out of the concrete and test that separately.

Commissioner Atwill asked how long the builder's work would be warranted.

Florea said he did not have an answer to that at the moment but would try to find that out.

The City of Columbia Parks Department, which has expertise, equipment, and personnel appropriate for trail maintenance, will take over the portion of the MKT Trail which has historically been the responsibility of the County from Jay Dix Station to where it meets the Katy Trail. The City Council has approved this agreement and it is ready for Commission approval.
