PROBLEM IDENTIFICATION

Substance-impaired drivers contributed to 27 percent of Missouri's traffic crash fatalities during the past five years. Alcohol remains the primary contributor to substance-impaired driving crashes; however, the number of persons under the influence of prescription medications and/or illicit drugs continues to increase. Male drivers were more likely than females to be involved in substance-impaired driving crashes. During the past five years, males were responsible for 82 percent of substance-impaired driving fatalities. Ten percent of the children less than 15 years of age who were killed in motor vehicle crashes over the last five years, were riding with a substance-impaired driver.

In the past three years (2015-2017) there have been 6,577 reported crashes (total number investigated by all agencies) in Boone County. Of those 6,577 crashes, 360 were Drinking-Involved crashes and 430 were Drinking and/or Drug Involved crashes. Of the 360 Drinking-Involved crashes, 133 of the crashes involved injury to a total of 176 persons and 13 involved the death of a total of 15 persons. Of the 430 Drinking and/or Drug Involved crashes, 165 of the crashes involved injury to a total of 230 persons and 18 involved the death of a total of 21 persons.

Boone County and the City of Columbia, which is the county seat, consistently have problems with Drinking-Involved crashes. Below are some of the rankings (2014-2016), which show how Boone County and the City of Columbia compare to the rest of the Missouri counties and cities when it come to drinking-involved crashes.

- -Alcohol Involved Traffic Crashes Boone County ranked 7th / City of Columbia ranked 5th
- Disabling Alcohol Involved Traffic Crashes Boone County ranked 9th / City of Columbia ranked 7th
- Fatal Alcohol Involved Traffic Crashes Boone County ranked 6th / City of Columbia ranked 3rd

In 2017, the Boone County Sheriff's Department made at least 120 arrests for DWI. In 2017, Boone County experienced 6 fatal drinking/drug-involved motor vehicle crashes (6 total deaths), 39 personal injury drinking/drug-involved crashes (55 persons injured) and 64 property damage drinking/drug-involved crashes. These numbers are lower than in 2016, when there were 8 fatal drinking/drug-involved motor vehicle crashes (10 total deaths), 72 personal injury drinking/drug-involved crashes (100 persons injured) and 93 property damage drinking/drug-involved crashes, however, impaired driving continues to be a serious problem in Boone County.

GOALS/OBJECTIVES

Core Performance Measure Goals

- 1. To decrease alcohol-impaired driving fatalities by 7.0 percent annually, resulting in a change to the 2014-2018 moving average from 242.8 (2011-2015 moving average) to 180.8 (2014-2018 moving average) by December 31, 2018.
- 2. Increase the number of substance-impaired driving arrests made during grant funded enforcement activities by .25 percent annually from the 2011-2015 calendar base year average of 6,249 to 6,265 by December 31, 2018.

Other Performance Measure Goals

1. To decrease alcohol-impaired driving serious injuries by 4.0 percent annually, resulting in a change to the 2014-2018 moving average from 686.0 (2011-2015 moving average) to 549.5 (2014-2018 moving average) by December 31, 2018.

The goal of the Boone County Sheriff's Department is to continue our commitment to combating impaired driving and support the state goal of decreasing impaired driving fatalities annually. During the 2018-2019 grant year, we plan to continue to utilize our Full-Time DWI / Traffic Unit to assist in addressing impaired driving on a regular nightly basis, in addition to conducting DWI saturation patrols throughout the year.

An objective is for our Full-Time DWI / Traffic unit to maintain a high profile, which includes continued press releases and highly visible patrol activities.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Boone County Sheriff's Department plans to continue using our Full-Time DWI/Traffic Unit personnel to combat impaired driving. If approved, this grant will assist in funding the salary and benefit costs of the two members of the Traffic Unit who will be tasked with conducting DWI enforcement. Both of these positions are currently filled with deputies.

Boone County continues to be one of the top-ranking counties in the state for drinking-involved traffic crashes. We believe our enforcement efforts make a difference in drinking-involved crashes and we plan to continue these efforts to address the crashes involving impaired drivers.

As described in the supplemental section, these units will primarily work evening, night and early morning hours (between 9:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m.) throughout the week. They will be assigned as Traffic Enforcement Deputies and primarily tasked with focusing on arresting impaired drivers throughout Boone County. They will work high traffic areas, problem roadways (like U.S. 63, Interstate 70, MO 163, etc.) and other roadways around Boone County.

Drinking involved traffic crashes have been occurring all around Boone County. From 2014 through 2016, 53.4% of the drinking involved traffic crashes in Boone County occurred on city streets and county roads. Our enforcement will be strongly focused on major thoroughfares in and around the city of Columbia, on county roads, and on state roadways around Boone County. Some of the roadways our unit will patrol will include Highway 63 (9.2% of the drinking involved traffic crashes), Interstate 70 (7.8% of the drinking involved traffic crashes), Missouri 763 (5.0% of the drinking involved crashes), Missouri 163 (4.8% of the drinking involved traffic crashes), and other roadways with higher frequencies of drinking involved traffic crashes.

PROBLEM IDENTIFICATION

Aggressive driving can be any one of us, when we make the choice to drive over the speed limit; change lanes several times in a short distance and/or follow too closely. Aggressive driving is a costly decision, often made in an instant, but can have lifelong consequences. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, aggressive driving is when an individual commits a combination of moving traffic offenses so as to endanger other persons or property. During the last five years, the combination of aggressive driving behaviors contributed to 53 percent of fatalities and 46 percent of serious injuries in Missouri. Speed-related conditions, including exceeding the speed limit and too fast for conditions, accounted for the most fatalities of all aggressive driving behaviors. Nearly 40 percent of all Missouri fatalities over the last five years were speed-related.

From January 2105 through December 2017, Boone County had 6,650 reported motor vehicle crashes and this number includes 54 fatal motor vehicle crashes. We know that more often that not, these motor vehicle crashes are caused, at least in part, by speeding, careless driving, inattention or other hazardous moving violations.

When looking at the probable contributing circumstances for the 6,650 reported motor vehicle crashes there are several that stand out. Below are the various probable contributing circumstances and the number (out of 6,650) of crashes that listed them as a probable factor in the crash.

Failed to Yield: 1,258 total
Following too Close: 993 total
Too Fast for Conditions: 889 total
Distracted/Inattentive: 945 total
Improper Lane use/Change: 873 total
Violation Signal/Sign: 284 total
Speed - Exceeded Limit: 230 total

Improper Turn: 193 total

Wrong Side (not passing): 109 total

Improper Passing: 91 total

- 1. To decrease speeding related fatalities by 7.0 percent annually, resulting in a change to the 2014-2018 moving average from 304.2 (2011-2015 moving average) to 294.8 (2014-2018 moving average) by December 31, 2018.
- 2. To increase the number of speeding citations issued during grant funded enforcement activities by .25 percent annually from the 2011-2015 calendar base year average of 72,901 to 73,083 by December 31, 2018.

Other Performance Measure Goals

1. To decrease aggressive driving-related fatalities by 7.0 percent annually, resulting in a change to the 2014-2018 moving average from 428.2 (2011-2015 moving average) to 430.9 (2014-2018 moving average) by December 31, 2018.

Goal:

To support the state goal of decreasing hazardous moving violation driving related crashes to include fatality crashes .

Objective:

Implement monthly enforcement details focusing on enforcing speeding violation and other hazardous moving violations.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Boone County Sheriff's Department is planning to perform slowdown operation enforcement details every month from October 2018 through September of 2019. These "Operation Slowdown" details will be performed throughout Boone County with concentration on known problem areas and areas with high traffic volumes.

Our intention is to schedule an average of six "shifts" per month that are each 4 hours in length for an average of 24 hours per month. These six shifts may be grouped together to allow several deputies to work at the same time or they may be spread throughout the month. Our goal will be to address all observed violations with an emphasis on enforcing speeding violations and other hazardous moving violations, such as speeding, following too close, careless and imprudent driving, stop sign/red-light violation, failure to yield and lane violations.

We have traditionally divided the "Operation Slowdown" enforcement efforts between county maintained roadways and the state maintained roadways to include Interstate 70 and U.S. Highway 63, which historically have had a high number of serious and fatal traffic crashes. In 2017, Boone County had 16 fatal motor vehicle crashes. Of the 16 fatal crashes, 7 of them occurred within the city of Columbia and 8 occurred on State Highways outside of the City of Columbia.

Since almost half of Boone County's fatal crashes occurred within the City of Columbia, the Boone County Sheriff's Department intends to utilize the grant to fund additional enforcement efforts inside the City of Columbia throughout the 2018-2019 grant year.

We are also asking for funding to reimburse Boone County Joint Communications for costs for dedicated dispatcher/communications operator for HMV activities. Due to the increased workload these organized enforcement activities create for Boone County Joint Communications, they will often bring in a dedicated dispatcher/communications operator to work the details. We are asking for funding to cover 72 hours for dispatcher/communications operator costs throughout the grant year.

PROBLEM IDENTIFICATION

Substance-impaired drivers contributed to 27 percent of Missouri's traffic crash fatalities during the past five years. Alcohol remains the primary contributor to substance-impaired driving crashes; however, the number of persons under the influence of prescription medications and/or illicit drugs continues to increase. Male drivers were more likely than females to be involved in substance-impaired driving crashes. During the past five years, males were responsible for 82 percent of substance-impaired driving fatalities. Ten percent of the children less than 15 years of age who were killed in motor vehicle crashes over the last five years, were riding with a substance-impaired driver.

In the past three years (2015-2017) there have been 6,577 reported crashes (total number investigated by all agencies) in Boone County. Of those 6,577 crashes, 360 were Drinking-Involved crashes and 430 were Drinking and/or Drug Involved crashes. Of the 360 Drinking-Involved crashes, 133 of the crashes involved injury to a total of 176 persons and 13 involved the death of a total of 15 persons. Of the 430 Drinking and/or Drug Involved crashes, 165 of the crashes involved injury to a total of 230 persons and 18 involved the death of a total of 21 persons.

Boone County and the City of Columbia, which is the county seat, consistently have problems with Drinking-Involved crashes. Below are some of the rankings (2014-2016), which show how Boone County and the City of Columbia compare to the rest of the Missouri counties and cities when it come to drinking-involved crashes.

- -Alcohol Involved Traffic Crashes Boone County ranked 7th / City of Columbia ranked 5th
- Disabling Alcohol Involved Traffic Crashes Boone County ranked 9th / City of Columbia ranked 7th
- Fatal Alcohol Involved Traffic Crashes Boone County ranked 6th / City of Columbia ranked 3rd

In 2017, the Boone County Sheriff's Department made at least 120 arrests for DWI. In 2017, Boone County experienced 6 fatal drinking/drug-involved motor vehicle crashes (6 total deaths), 39 personal injury drinking/drug-involved crashes (55 persons injured) and 64 property damage drinking/drug-involved crashes. These numbers are lower than in 2016, when there were 8 fatal drinking/drug-involved motor vehicle crashes (10 total deaths), 72 personal injury drinking/drug-involved crashes (100 persons injured) and 93 property damage drinking/drug-involved crashes, however, impaired driving continues to be a serious problem in Boone County.

GOALS/OBJECTIVES

Core Performance Measure Goals

- 1. To decrease alcohol-impaired driving fatalities by 7.0 percent annually, resulting in a change to the 2014-2018 moving average from 242.8 (2011-2015 moving average) to 180.8 (2014-2018 moving average) by December 31, 2018.
- 2. Increase the number of substance-impaired driving arrests made during grant funded enforcement activities by .25 percent annually from the 2011-2015 calendar base year average of 6,249 to 6,265 by December 31, 2018.

Boone County continues to be one of the top-ranking counties in the state for drinking-involved traffic crashes. We believe our enforcement efforts make a difference in drinking-involved crashes and we plan to continue these efforts to address the crashes involving impaired drivers.

As described in the supplemental section, the DWI saturation enforcement patrols will primarily work evening, night and early morning hours (between 4:00 p.m. and 4:00 a.m.) throughout the week. PROBLEM IDENTIFICATION

Substance-impaired drivers contributed to 27 percent of Missouri's traffic crash fatalities during the past five years. Alcohol remains the primary contributor to substance-impaired driving crashes; however, the number of persons under the influence of prescription medications and/or illicit drugs continues to increase. Male drivers were more likely than females to be involved in substance-impaired driving crashes. During the past five years, males were responsible for 82 percent of substance-impaired driving fatalities. Ten percent of the children less than 15 years of age who were killed in motor vehicle crashes over the last five years, were riding with a substance-impaired driver.

There are several high schools and at least 3 college campuses in the Columbia/Boone County area, so we have a large youth (under 21 years of age) population. Members of the Boone County Sheriff's Department often encounter underage individuals that have been consuming intoxicants. It is also well known that youth have been able to purchase alcohol at locations within Boone County.

When looking at the Missouri state-wide statistics for "Missouri 21 and Under Driver Alcohol Involved Traffic Crashes" from 2014 - 2016, Boone County was ranked as the 5th highest county in the state and the City of Columbia is ranked as the 3rd highest city in the state.

GOALS/OBJECTIVES

Core Performance Measure Goals

- 1. To decrease alcohol-impaired driving fatalities by 7.0 percent annually, resulting in a change to the 2014-2018 moving average from 242.8 (2011-2015 moving average) to 180.8 (2014-2018 moving average) by December 31, 2018.
- 2. Increase the number of substance-impaired driving arrests made during grant funded enforcement activities by .25 percent annually from the 2011-2015 calendar base year average of 6,249 to 6,265 by December 31, 2018.

Other Performance Measure Goals

1. To decrease alcohol-impaired driving serious injuries by 4.0 percent annually, resulting in a change to the 2014-2018 moving average from 686.0 (2011-2015 moving average) to 549.5 (2014-2018 moving average) by December 31, 2018.

Our goal with this program is to help support the goal of decreasing the alcohol-impaired drivers under the age of 21. We believe by using this program to reduce the availability of alcoholic beverages to those less than 21 years of age it will help reduce the number of impaired drivers under the age of 21 on our roadways.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Deputies will conduct alcohol compliance checks at various businesses and/or events where alcoholic beverages are sold around Boone County. They will also conduct party patrols throughout Boone County, to deter under-age drinking at private residences/locations.

TAX COLLECTION AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT, effective January 1, 2018, by and between the **Columbia and Boone County Library District**, a Missouri political subdivision, hereinafter called the "Library" and Boone County, Missouri, through the Boone County Commission, hereinafter called the "County", and Tom Schauwecker, Boone County Assessor, hereinafter called the "Assessor", Taylor W. Burks, Boone County Clerk, hereinafter called the "Clerk", and Brian C. McCollum, Boone County Collector of Revenue, hereinafter called the "Collector";

WHEREAS, the Library and County are empowered, under Article VI, Section 16 of the Missouri Constitution, RSMo Sections 182.301 and 70.220, to enter into certain cooperative agreements for collection of property taxes; and

WHEREAS, the parties hereto believe it to be mutually advantageous for the County to assess, prepare and collect Library property taxes for the Library for an agreed compensation;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained, it is hereby agreed by and between the parties hereto as follows:

I

The County by and through the County Assessor agrees to perform the assessment function of determining the fair market value and true assessed value of all real and personal property located within the Library boundaries.

II

The County, on behalf of the Library, shall create tax billing amounts relating to all real and personal property located within the Library boundaries. Such billing amounts are to be included on tax bills generated on taxable property within the boundaries of the Library.

Ш

The County, by and through the County Collector, hereby agrees to bill and collect, on behalf of the Library, all monies due and owing the Library for property taxes on taxable property within the boundaries of the Library. IV

The County agrees that the Library shall have access, during reasonable times and under the supervision of the Clerk or Collector, whichever is appropriate, to all data relating to the Library taxes accumulated under the tax collection and processing system.

V

The Collector agrees to remit to the Library the receipts due the Library at the same time the Collector remits other receipts similarly collected on behalf of other political subdivisions within the County; provided, however, that there shall be a remittance to the Library at least once per month at which time the Collector shall provide a Monthly Statement of Collections and Distributions report. All collections made which relate to the prior Columbia Library District or the prior Boone County Library District shall be remitted to Library as the merged, consolidated library district as contemplated in RSMo Section 182.291. The parties may by separate agreement authorize the Collector to disburse funds to the County Treasurer as part of a pooled investment cooperative agreement.

VI

The Library shall fix its ad valorem property tax rates as provided in RSMo Section 67.110 not later than September first for entry in the tax books and communicate that in writing to County not later than September first of each year. If the Library should fail to comply with RSMo Section 67.110, then no property tax rate, other than the rate, if any, necessary to pay the interest in principal on any outstanding bonds, shall be certified for that year and the Collector will neither bill nor collect Library property taxes for that year, either current or delinquent. However, the Collector will continue to collect and disburse prior year taxes under this agreement. A new agreement will have to be entered into by all parties to resume collecting current property taxes.

VII

The parties agree that the Collector shall have the responsibility for collection of all current and delinquent property taxes, including penalties, interest, and fees. Such collection of taxes, penalties, interest, and fees shall be conducted in accordance with applicable law(s). The Library shall provide to the County Collector all Library Resolutions relating to penalties and interest on delinquent taxes at the time of execution of this Contract and to provide the County Collector with any changes to such Library Resolutions or any new Library Resolutions related to the same by September 1 of the tax year in which such changes shall take effect. The collection of late

charges by the Collector, however, is conditioned upon such charges being consistent with other taxing entities.

VIII

The parties agree to the following: The Collector shall withhold a sum equal to one percent (1%) of all property taxes, penalties, and fees collected by the Collector on behalf of the Library as compensation for the bill creation and collection services herein provided by the County and said sum shall be deposited by the Collector in the Boone County general revenue fund. As contemplated by RSMo Sections 137,720.1 and 137,750, the Collector further shall withhold one-half of one percent (1/2%) of all ad valorem property taxes collected by the Collector on behalf of the Library to fund the costs and expenses incurred in assessing real property. As further contemplated by RSMo Sections 137.720.3 and Section 137.750, the Collector further shall withhold each calendar year an additional one-eighth of one percent (1/8%) of all ad valorem property taxes collected by the Collector on behalf of the Library, provided that for each calendar year, if the total amount of ad valorem property taxes so further withheld by the Collector from the political subdivisions in Boone County, Missouri under Section 137.720.3 RSMo shall exceed One Hundred Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$125,000.00), the Collector shall pay to the Library once during each calendar year such proportionate amount so further withheld the previous calendar year, plus interest, if any, on such sums received on behalf of the Library and other political subdivisions in excess of the aforementioned statutory limits. All sums withheld by the Collector, as required by RSMo Sections 137.720 and Section 137.750, shall be deposited by the Collector in the Boone County Assessment Fund. All amounts withheld by the Collector shall be withheld proportionately from each separate property tax. The Collector shall then remit to the Library the balance collected after the applicable amounts have been withheld from each separate property tax; and, the Collector shall provide a Monthly Statement of Collections and Distributions report. If the General Assembly changes the percentages or caps set out in the statutes referenced in this paragraph, then the Collector shall collect those amounts authorized by the General Assembly and shall notify Library of such changes in writing; thereafter, this Agreement shall be considered amended so as to reflect the new amounts authorized by statute.

IX

The Library further agrees that the penalty authorized by RSMo Section 52.290, as amended, for delinquent taxes shall be retained by the County and distributed as provided in Section RSMo Sec. 52.290.

X

The Library further agrees that all fees of conducting any tax sale pursuant to Chapter 140 of the Revised Statutes of Missouri shall be retained by the County.

ΧI

The Library further agrees that the County shall be authorized to compromise and abate property taxes owed to the Library in the same manner as it authorized by the Revised Statutes of Missouri to compromise and abate other taxes.

XII

The Library shall provide to the County Clerk and the County Assessor a certified copy of any ordinance or order altering the boundaries of the Library, including but not limited to Resolutions annexing or de-annexing any lot or lots of real estate, within 30 days of the adoption of the same and prior to October 1 of each year. The Library shall provide beginning and ending address range data for properties located within the Library for the initial boundaries of the Library and for all boundary changes of the Library.

 \mathbf{XIII}

The parties hereto mutually agree that the term of this agreement begins upon acceptance by all parties and ends February 28, 2019. The parties hereto mutually agree that this contract will be automatically renewed on March 1, 2019, and will continue to renew on March 1 of each subsequent year unless any party serves written notice of termination no less than ninety (90) days prior to the renewal date. Upon termination of this Agreement, the County shall be absolved of all responsibility for collection of property taxes for that tax year and for future tax years. The County shall continue to be responsible for the collection of delinquent property taxes from all years covered by this Agreement.

XIV

The Library agrees that failure to comply with statutory provisions relating to the setting of tax levies shall relieve the County of responsibilities under this Agreement.

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 137.073.7 RSMo, no tax rate shall be extended on the tax rolls unless the has complied with the tax rate certification process through the State Auditor's office.

COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT DEPOSIT POOL

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into this day of <u>February</u>, 2018, between **Boone County, Missouri**, a first-class statutory county in the State of Missouri ("County"), and **Columbia and Boone County Library District**, a unified, merged library district formed under the provisions of RSMo §182.291 ("Library District").

WHEREAS, Library District has a need to invest certain unexpended funds; and WHEREAS, County, by and through the County Treasurer, has a program of investments which are consistent with the requirements of RSMo §30.270 that County routinely uses for County's funds in order to earn interest on its own unexpended funds; and

WHEREAS, Library District desires to pool certain amounts of its funds with County for investment purposes so as to benefit from County's established investment program and avoid needless duplication of administrative costs; and

WHEREAS, County is willing to provide these services to the Library District under the terms and conditions set out herein; and

WHEREAS, the parties have the authority to enter into this Cooperative Agreement under the provisions of RSMo §182.301 and RSMo §70.220.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS AGREED BY AND BETWEEN THE PARTIES AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. <u>TERM</u>: This Cooperative Agreement shall be in effective as of January 1, 2018 until terminated as provided for in this paragraph. Either party may terminate this agreement upon sixty (60) days notice by notifying the other, in writing, of their intention to terminate this Cooperative Agreement.
- 2. <u>DEPOSITS</u>: Library District may deposit with the County such sums as it desires County to place in its investment pool by directing such funds via check to the County Treasurer with clear instructions that the subject funds are being sent to be invested in accordance with this Cooperative Agreement, however the County Treasurer may authorize the transmittal of such funds via electronic transfer. The Library District and County Collector may by mutual agreement, memorialized in writing or electronic mail, facilitate a direct distribution of Library

District tax revenues from the County Collector to the County Treasurer for investment on behalf of the Library District in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.

- 3. <u>COUNTY OBLIGATIONS</u>: The County, by and through the County Treasurer, will invest said funds in a reasonably prompt manner in such investments as the County Treasurer deems advisable provided said investments are authorized by RSMo §30.270. Earnings on the pooled investments will be calculated by the County Treasurer and the County Treasurer will provide Library District with a monthly activity statement. Earnings calculations shall use the same methodology that the County Treasurer employs when allocating earnings among the various pooled Funds held for the County.
- 4. <u>AVAILABILITY OF FUNDS</u>: County will endeavor to make funds deposited for investment with the County available to the Library District as soon as possible after notice. If the Library District's requirements for funds are such that there is insufficient time to allow the County Treasurer to prudently liquidate investments in order to make the requested funds available without incurring any penalty or fee, then the Library District will be responsible for any penalties or fees incurred as a result of their need for funds on an expedited basis, as determined in the sole discretion of the County Treasurer. The County Treasurer will provide documentation to the Library District documenting any fees or penalties incurred as a result of the Library District's request. The Library District shall endeavor to provide ten (10) business day's notice to the County Treasurer. The County Treasurer shall make said funds available via a check made payable to the Library District unless the County Treasurer receives written authorization from the Library District to remit funds via electronic transfer to an account designated by the Library District, provided such electronic transfer can occur without charge to the County.
- 5. <u>LIABILITY</u>: To the fullest extent permitted by law, the Library District agrees to hold County harmless for any damages in connection with the deposits placed with the County under this Cooperative Agreement. The Library District understands that the County Treasurer will invest deposited funds consistent with RSMo §30.270, but that there still remains a risk of loss of principal in those authorized investments. In the event of loss of principal in funds held by the County Treasurer, loss calculations shall use the same methodology that the County

Treasurer employs when allocating earnings among the various pooled Funds held for the County.

- 6. <u>THIRD PARTIES</u>: The parties to this Cooperative Agreement do not intend to create any obligations or rights for any party not a signatory hereto.
- 7. WAIVER: Waiver by either party of any term, covenant, or condition hereof shall not operate as a waiver of any subsequent breach of the same or any other term, covenant or condition. No term, covenant, or condition of this Cooperative Agreement can be waived except by written consent, and forbearance or indulgence of either party in any regard whatsoever shall not constitute a waiver of the same to be performed by the party to which the same may apply. Until complete performance by the party of the subject term, covenant, or condition, the non-breaching party shall be entitled to invoke any remedy available to it under this Cooperative Agreement or by law despite any such forbearance or indulgence.
- 8. <u>NON-APPROPRIATION</u>: All obligations of the County and Library District under this Cooperative Agreement which require the expenditure of additional funds are conditioned upon the availability of funds appropriated for that purpose.
- 9. <u>ASSIGNMENT</u>: Neither party may assign or transfer any of its rights or obligations under this Cooperative Agreement to any other person without the prior, written approval of the other party.

- 13. <u>HEADINGS; CONSTRUCTION OF CONTRACT</u>: The headings of each section of this Cooperative Agreement are for reference only. Unless the context of this Cooperative Agreement clearly requires otherwise, all terms and words used herein, regardless of the number and gender in which used, shall be construed to include any other number, singular or plural, or any other gender, masculine, feminine, or neutral, the same as if such words had been fully and properly written in that number or gender.
- 14. <u>AUTHORITY</u>: The signatories to this Cooperative Agreement, by signing this agreement, represent that they have obtained authority by Order or Ordinance to enter into this agreement on behalf of the respective parties hereto and bind such parties to all terms and conditions contained herein.
