

EFFORTS PRIOR TO THE CONFERENCE

2018

The Children's Services Board <u>created the High Risk Youth</u> <u>Committee</u> to discuss strategies to address issues related to youth. Initial conversations of this committee focused on bringing the community together to address youth violence.

2019

The High Risk Youth Committee organized the <u>Youth Violence</u> <u>Prevention Forum</u> in 2019 to get input from community stakeholders on organizing a Youth Violence Prevention conference.





Youth focus groups were held to hear from youth what is going well, what isn't, and potential solutions for our community. The results of this study are discussed in the Voices for Collective Impact: Honoring Youth Perspectives report.



Voices for Collective Impact: Youth Violence Prevention Conference Overview

The High Risk Youth Committee, a Boone County Children's Services Board (BCCSB) committee, coordinated a conference to bring community-wide stakeholders to learn, discuss, and develop an action plan to reduce youth violence and improve the well-being of children in Boone County.

SETTING THE STAGE

The conference started with presentations focused on the action plan goal statements and review survey results of conference participants perception on youth violence.

DEVELOPING STRATEGIES

Conference participants were split into four action planning groups each focused on one of the action plan goal statements. Participants developed and prioritized strategies to achieve the action planning goals.




NEXT STEPS

Strategies developed within each action planning goal statement were shared out with all conference participants. The BCCSB plans to continue implementing the action plan and provide funding opportunity(ies) to implement strategies to address youth violence.

Pre-Conference Participants Survey

During registration, participants identified how much of a problem they felt youth violence was in our community. Majority of participants felt youth violence was a major problem in our community. Since the COVID-19 Pandemic, more participants feel youth violence is a major problem.




Participant Feelings about Youth Violence



PRE-CONFERENCE PARTICIPANTS SURVEY

When asked what the most important issues impacting youth violence within Boone County, MO were, participants shared several issues they felt impacted youth violence. The most commonly repeated themes included:



Most Important Issues Identified by Participants



PRE-CONFERENCE SURVEY

YOUTH SUPPORTS

The need for accessible youth supports including afterschool programs, safe places to spend time/hang out, and to access needed services.

YOUTH NEED FOR POSITIVE ROLE MODELS

Next participants noted the importance of having positive role models.

MENTAL HEALTH ACCESS

Mental health access – including representative mental health providers, affordable options for therapy and other services.

PARENTING ISSUES

Parents need help supporting youth.

ECONOMIC ISSUES

Issues surrounding poverty impact youth.

RACISM/SYSTEMTIC BARRIERS

Racism and systemic barriers limits access to resources in the community and impacts youth participating in violence.

MEDIA REPRESENTATION

Lack of representation in media outside of law issues for people of color. Social media influencers participating in violence make it "cool" want to be seen as successful.



SETTING THE STAGE: PRESENTATIONS



ACTION PLANNING: Developing strategies

The second part of the conference consisted of developing strategies to achieve the four action planning goal statements. Participants were asked which action planning area they would like to develop strategies for and were pre-assigned to groups. They worked in small groups developing potential strategies and then reported out with other groups with the same goal. The strategies were entered into a survey and participants were asked to select three strategies they thought should be prioritized. All conference participants were brought back together and each action planning goal area reported out the developed strategies and summary of their survey results.

PRIORITIZED STRATEGIES:

YOUTH ACHIEVE THEIR FULL POTENTIAL ACADEMICALLY, ARE HEALTHY, AND HAVE ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES.

- Increase trauma-informed conversations in a coordinated approach between school and communication
- Allow youth to lead initiatives, e.g. being a part of designing/planning/executing their ideas for s
 identify as the issues/problems.
- Provide more pro-social activities for youth to engage in where they feel safe.
- Authentically listen to youth, validate their concerns/perspectives, and act based on their feedb trust.
- Increased opportunities for Mental Health services in both school and community-based system
- Start providing real-world/life skill instruction much earlier in education, e.g. elementary school
- Create more community-based centers or tap into exisiting settings like churches for youth to be life skill development.
- Provide paid internships and other alternative settings/learning opportunties that allow for appl world.
- Develop relationships with businesses specifically to coordinate mentorships for youth.
- Provide more access to post-secondary opportunties outside of traditional college/traditional particular par
- Strategically invite, engage, and empower youth who aren't as engaged/who may not think their
- Provide more academic supports and better engagement for 'middle' or 'majority' group of stude 'coasting along' by engaging them in core/universally-required classes.
- Support youth and families to grow their own healthy foods.
- Look to organizations to help increase mentorships in the community.
- Train seniors/retirees to authentically listen to youth and train their peers/other adults, based of from youths' input/perspectives.
