
Boone County Ready

Heart Health Awareness Month

Heart disease is the leading killer among both men and women. Occupational hazards, genetics and lifestyle choices all contribute to our risk for heart disease. First responders have an occupational risk for developing heart disease due to the nature of their work. Many risk factors are out of our control, but many factors are not.



Steps you can take to reduce your risk include: cut back on smoking and drinking, watch your salt intake, get 30 minutes of physical activity a day, increase your water intake, maintain a healthy weight and ensure your blood pressure is controlled.

Partner Spotlight

The Missouri Structural Assessment and Visual Evaluation (SAVE) Coalition is a group of volunteer engineers, architects, building inspectors and other trained professionals that respond to requests from local jurisdictions to the Missouri State Emergency Management Agency (SEMA) for assistance with building damage inspections.

More than 1,000 professionals are trained as SAVE volunteers in Missouri and are ready to respond to communities in need across the state. When local governments contact SEMA for assistance after a disaster, SAVE volunteer coordinators deploy available inspectors to the affected area to perform building assessments.

Most recently, the SAVE Coalition responded to the town of Williamsville just outside Poplar Bluff after a 4.0 magnitude earthquake rocked the area

Save MOLives



Have you noticed the recent spike in fatal traffic accidents in Boone County? Driving the wrong direction, traveling at high speeds, not wearing a seat belt, distracted driving & driving under the influence all contribute to fatal car accidents. In order to prevent fatal accidents, call 911 & report if you see someone driving recklessly.

Different scenarios require different actions. When in doubt—call 911.

- 1. Post-Accident, vehicles pulled over to median: Slow down, give them space, & continue to drive safely.
- 2. Single car alone with occupants: If you believe for any reason the vehicle may need assistance, call 911 & report it.
- 3. Car on the side of the road with caution tape: Car will be towed.
- 4. Car abandoned, not occupied, no caution tape: Report by calling 311.

What if you are the one in an accident? If no one is injured or impaired, both vehicles should move to a safe location to exchange information &/ contact law enforcement.

If you want to be a part of the solution, follow these Safe Driving Tips:

- Check the MoDOT Traveler Map before hitting the road
- Sign up for Smart911 and opt-in to receive alerts
- Create a Winter Car Kit and keep it in your vehicle at all times
- If you are stuck in traffic, do NOT cross over the median. You could get stuck or cause an accident on the outer road.
- If first responders have closed down a lane, do not cross back into that lane until after you pass the accident and barriers are gone.
- Keep your phone down, and be alert while driving
- Move over or slow down—it's <u>State law</u>.
