Wildzire Prevention



The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) oversees Fire Management and Wildfire Prevention statewide. Wildfires are preventable if we follow the required safety measures provided by MDC. As Smokey the Bear says, "only YOU can prevent forest fires." As residents of Boone County, many of us live in a Wildland Urban Interface (WUI). WUI are found in every part of the country where people live in areas with vegetation near houses and little clearance. Learn more about reducing the risk fro wildire if you live in the WUI here. According to the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) wildfire embers can travel up to 24 miles before landing.

 $\underline{\text{Campfires}}, \underline{\text{outdoor equipment}} \text{ and } \underline{\text{debris burning}} \text{ can lead to wildfire if best practices are not followed.}$ Learn more about wildfire prevention $\underline{\text{here}}$.

<u>Preparing for wildfires</u> is like preparing for any other emergency or disaster, <u>there are 4 key steps!</u>

- 1. **Be Informed**: Have several ways to receive alerts. Download the Smart911 App and opt-in to emergency notification through Boone County Ready Alerts.
- 2. **Make a Plan:** Make sure everyone in your household knows and understands what to do if your location is threatened and you need to evacuate.
- 3. **Build a Kit** Have enough supplies for your household and pets, including a first aid kit, in your go bag and your vehicle. Make sure your important documents are in a water & fireproof container.
- 4. **Get Involved**: Create a fire-resistant zone that is free of flammable materials at least 30 feet from your home. Know your evacuation routes, practice with your household, petes and identify where you will meet.

Unfortunately, many wildfires are set intentionally. You can help stop Forest Arson by calling 800-392-1111 and making an anonymous report

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Partner Spotlight

May hosts National Dam Safety Day on May 31st and also the OEM's Boone County Ready Dam Safety Workshop on May 18th. Therefore, this month's spotlight is on Missouri Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

The mission of DNR is to protect Missouri's air, land, water, and mineral resources. They have a range of services available to help Missouri citizens, communities and businesses to protect and improve air, land and water resources.

DNR has divisions for administrative support, energy, environmental quality, state parks, and geological surveys. The State of Missouri's Dam and Reservoir Safety Program is overseen by DNR within the Geological Survey Division.

Ryan Stack, PE, is the Dam and Reservoir Safety Program Director and has been instrumental in the development of the Boone County Ready Dam Safety Workshop being held on May 18th in which he brings vital dam safety information to the citizens of Boone County.

They work with local governments and dam owners and operators to ensure all regulated dam owners and operators have emergency action plans in place across the state of Missouri.

Alerts and warnings are intended to notify the public when there in impending hazardous weather or other local emergencies. In order for the alerts and warnings to be effective, you need to understand what they mean and what actions you should take, right?

There are three types of weather alerts issued by the National Weather Servicer (NWS):

- Advisory: This is telling you to be aware of the situation. NWS is phasing this out.
- **Watch**: This is telling you to be prepared for the situation because it may impact your location.
- Warning: This is telling you to take action for the situation because it is occurring and could be life threatening.

Not all hazards have an advisory, watch or warning. Learn more about watches and warnings here. You can use the '12 Ways to Prepare' information available here to learn what you can do before disaster strikes.

Last year, the NWS began issuing a "Destructive Tag" with Severe Thunderstorm Warnings. A "destructive tag" now sets off Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEA) when a warning is issued that includes either 80+ mph winds or baseball-sized hail. Boone County's Outdoor Warning Sirens (OWS) also initiate in the event of a Severe Thunderstorm Warning with a "destructive tag" from the NWS. In addition to alerts pushed by the NWS, our office utilizes Boone County Ready Alerts, powered by

Smart911, to push out emergency notifications to those who have created a safety profile and opted-in to receive notifications. This service is paid for by tax dollars and free to all who live, work and play in Boone County but it is subscription-based meaning you have to opt-in in order to receive the notifications and take advantage of the benefits the service offers. To find out if you are opted-in for alerts, open your Smart911 app, go to 'Settings' --> 'Subscription-Based' --> Toggle 'Notifications from Boone County, MO Office of Emergency Management / 911' so that it turns blue. Then, scroll through the list and opt-in to the alerts that are applicable to you. You can sign up for Text, Email or Voice Call (listed in that order). Still having trouble? Give me a call and I can walk you through it!
