September is National Preparedness Month so it is our month to shine. The Boone County Ready campaign guides all who live, work, study, play and shop in Boone County through the 4 steps of preparedness. In addition, our website offers the tools to complete these 4 steps for little to no cost. Not all materials available in-house are included on the website yet but all online materials are also available as hard copies for free to citizens upon request.

Step 1: Be Informed

The easiest way to start your preparedness journey is by being informed. Text SMART911 to 67283 to receive a link to download the Smart911 App or create a safety profile online. Boone County Ready is powered by Smart911; this is how you can create a safety profile and opt-in for emergency alerts and notifications.

Step 2: Build a Kit

Have an emergency kit in your car and house in case you must shelter in place or a 'go-bag' ready in case you must evacuate quickly. Many items are available at the dollar store and several items are things that you have already they just need to be gathered into one place. Review the kit checklist today!

Step 3: Make a Plan

Know what you will do when a disaster or emergency strikes, who you will contact, and where you will meet. <u>Use our template to help you develop a plan for your household.</u>

Step 4: Get Involved

Getting involved in preparedness could be volunteering <u>with a local</u> <u>organization</u> to get to know more people and create more connections, or it could mean <u>becoming CPR Certified</u>, <u>taking the CERT Basic Training</u>, <u>discussing preparedness with community organizations</u>, or practicing <u>your</u> plan with your household regularly.
