Winter weather can be pretty extreme. Depending on the time of day that winter weather hits, it could cause you to be stranded at home, work or school. If you want to be prepared for a winter storm no matter where you are - start by making an emergency kit for your home (or your car - see below). During winter weather it is possible that you could lose power or water. Having an emergency kit prepared allows for you to be ready whenever an emergency happens. Our emergency kit checklist is a great resource for all weather hazards. When preparing for winter storms, if you are able to, gather supplies that could get your family through for 2 weeks. Although three days is a good start for a go bag (a portable emergency kit for if you need to leave your home quickly), it's likely if you are sheltering at home that you could need up to 2 weeks of supplies. The key is to build up to it a little at a time, starting with a 3-day baseline.

#### I WANT TO GET WINTER READY



#### WINTER CAR KIT

Winter weather causes an increase in traffic accidents. You could be stranded on the highway for hours due to an accident or maybe lose control of your own vehicle and end up in a ditch. Keep your gas tank half full and gather these necessary items to keep in your car today.



#### **POWER OUTAGES**

Power outages can be prepared for in advance. Follow the 4 steps of preparedness (see Boone County Ready section on page 5). It's a good idea to have several flashlights, extra batteries, lots of blankets, a back-up power pack for your smart devices, and, if possible, a generator.

Boone County saw historic wind chills Christmas week which prompted warming shelters to open. Winter Storm Elliott killed nearly 60 people, delayed flights and affected energy infrastructure. Eastern US Power Grid issued a Stage 2 System-Wide Emergency during the winter storm as well.

In LA, a state of emergency is declared for homelessness while in El Paso a state of emergency is declared for a surge in migration along the US-Mexico border. Metropolitan Water District, the nation's largest water supplier, has announced a drought emergency for all of Southern California; a move that will likely bring water restrictions to the area in 2023.

Jamaica has issued a statewide emergency to fight violent crime which allows for search and arrest without warrant. A Rohingya refugee ship that was believed to be lost at sea for two weeks was rescued. Over a million Rohingya refugees have fled violence in Myanmar in successive waves of displacement since the early 1990s. An influx that the United Nations Refugee Agency believes is one of the largest and fastest growing migrant crises in decades.



#### RESOURCE CORNER

The Missouri Department of Transportation (MO DOT) offers an extremely useful and free resource for Missouri residents called the Traveler Map. This map allows users to check their planned routes to make sure road conditions and traffic flow are favorable and safe for the drive.

The mission of the Boone County Ready campaign is to enhance community preparedness, foster collaboration and build resilience by engaging our citizens in actively preparing for emergencies and disasters.

Here's how you can become #BooneCountyReady for winter weather:

#### 1.Be Informed

Create a Boone County Ready, powered by Smart911, safety profile, optin for weather alerts, traffic alerts, emergency alerts and Boone County Ready non-emergency notifications. Purchase a battery-operated or hand crank NOAA weather radio so you can stay aware if the other communication sources are down.




#### 2. Make a Plan

Talk to your household about what to do if you are separated during an emergency or stranded in cold weather. Make an evacuation plan. Talk to your doctor for advice on storing medicine or using power-dependent devices.

#### 3. Build a Kit

Have a car kit in your vehicle at all times, and a well-stocked emergency kit in your home (for each household member) in the event of a power outage or consecutive snowed in days.



Educate yourself on the signs of hypothermia and frostbite and learn how you would treat them. Install carbon monoxide detectors with battery back-up throughout the house. Ensure you have fire extinguishers in your home and that everyone knows how to use them (Google P.A.S.S.) Know how to shut off your main water valve in case a pipe bursts from the cold.

For 2023, we will use this section to provide our readers with a recap of projects each of us have been working on during the previous month.

For now, we are going to share a few of our accomplishments from 2022. We look forward to serving our community in the year to come and the opportunities for growth it may offer.



Bart assisted with maintaining our generators, updating equipment inventory and compiling active shooter kits for first responders.

Paige started with OEM on December 5th, quickly adapting to the work environment, and getting familiar with her role and responsibilities as Planning and Preparedness Specialist. During her first month with our team, she began working under Sherril Gladney to learn about the county's plan she is responsible for maintaining.

Sherril gathered information from OEM and developed an end-of-the-year update to our Strategic Plan. Sherril began updates to the Boone County Hazard Mitigation Plan and working with our new Planning & Preparedness Specialist, Paige Lewis, as she settles into her new role.

Matt coordinated both the full-scale Columbia Regional Airport Triennial Exercise and the annual LEPC tabletop exercise. He fostered the growth of the CERT Team by helping to bring in 5 new members and delivered in-person Basic Training again for the first time since COVID-19. He was also accepted to the FEMA Master Exercise Practitioner Program where he will join high class exercise design staff from around the country in honing his exercise design skills.

Hannah was able to cross off several of her professional goals in 2022 thanks to collaboration with her OEM co-workers. She was able to take a public information training, launch the Boone County Ready community preparedness campaign, beginning the process to bring IPAWS to the county, draft the county's Disaster Recovery Plan and nearly close out both of the county's open public assistance applications for COVID-19 and the June 2021 flooding.

Chris believes the OEM overall has accomplished many things to be proud of, more than could fit in this section! With the help of OEM staff, he was able to activate the EOC in order to monitor MU home football games with stakeholders including the National Weather Service, Boone County Sheriff's Office, Missouri State Highway Patrol, Columbia Fire Dept., Columbia Police Dept., and University of Missouri entities including MU System Emergency Management, MU Athletics, MU Health and the MU Police Dept.
