

COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM

Boone County Office of Emergency Management has proudly adopted the Online CERT hybrid learning model developed by the University of Utah School of Medicine. Online CERT is self-paced, and progress can be saved any time and resumed later. The course covers the standardized 2019 FEMA curriculum and is available in multiple languages.

The course is presented through a multimedia learning experience including videos, virtual reality simulations, interactive knowledge checks and more with live IT support. Online CERT combines 12 hours of online lecture, accessible via mobile device or desktop, and 16 hours of hands-on practical training administered by our office. At the completion of the online course, participants are issued a certificate, and become eligible to register for the proctored practical skills training.

Someone who is severely bleeding could bleed to death in less than 5 minutes! Minutes matter. Stop the Bleed training teaches participants how to 'stop the bleed' in order to improve the chances that the injured do not die before EMS arrives. The training allows for bystanders have the necessary tools they need to save lives in severe bleed incidents.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency offers FREE online training through their website, <u>training.fema.gov</u>.

In order to search and take these trainings, you just need to register for a FEMA student identification number (SID). You can do this online at <u>https://cdp.dhs.gov/femasid</u>. Independent Study (IS) courses are a great way to broaden your knowledge of emergency preparedness, management, and response for your household, business, or organization.



- Talk to those in your community about your emergency plan for your home, work, school, or organization.
- Provide emergency kits to those who rely on you.
- Discuss emergency procedures with your employer, school, faith community, etc.
- If emergency plans are not in place, champion the effort to making your community safer.

Here's how you can become #BooneCountyReady for the extreme heat that the summer months will bring.

1.BE INFORMED

Update your Boone County Ready, powered by Smart911, profile. Purchase a weather radio to keep in your bedroom.

2. MAKE A PLAN

Talk to your household about who to contact outside of your local community. Have numbers written down and in your emergency kits.

3. BUILD A KIT

Add sunscreen, insect repellent and a hat to your emergency kits for the summer months.

4. GET INVOLVED

Consider organizing a Stop the Bleed training for your church, school or workplace.

Paige worked on obtaining her CPR/BLS instructor certification. She will now be able to certify others in CPR! Paige also attended the state show-me symposium and learned more about managing volunteers in Boone County. She also completed her Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) basic training class. Besides that, Paige has been working her day-to-day responsibilities in the OEM Office.

Hannah continued to work towards closing DR 4490 (COVID-19) and DR 4612 (2021 Flooding). In addition to maintaining the OEM and Boone County Ready social media pages, she also participated in two media projects with KOMU to educate citizens on preparedness action steps to take leading up to the county's severe weather. She attended a Region F THIRA Meeting, coordinated the quarterly LEPC meeting, and continued work on Boone County's first Disaster Recovery Plan. She completed Social Media Tools & Techniques, a training offered through the State Emergency Management Agency (SEMA). She presented to the Columbia Senior Activity Center, instructed the 4th grade students at Grant Elementary on our Youth Preparedness Program, staffed a pop-up info table at the Columbia Mall, attended a REDI Board Meeting, and established a relationship with Boone County Family Resources for future outreach and emergency planning projects for our community members with access & functional needs.

Bart worked on administrative tasks to keep our office well-oiled and running. He answers all of the phone calls to the ECC, updates EOC computers, checks the OEM vehicles biweekly, pays the bills, and visits siren sites to see if they need any landscaping maintenance.
