SEPTEMBER NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS MONTH

September is National Preparedness Month, a timely reminder to ensure you and your family are ready for any emergency, big or small. Disasters—whether natural like earthquakes, floods, and wildfires, or unexpected events like power outages—can strike without warning.

NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS MONTH

Launched in 2004 by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) in response to 9/11, National Preparedness Month encourages individuals and families to take simple yet crucial steps to enhance their preparedness.

This year's theme is "Start a Conversation", which highlights the importance of discussing disasters proactively with loved ones. Talking about bad things that could happen like a disaster or emergency isn't always easy.





We may think we're protecting the people we love by avoiding these conversations, but they are important to start taking steps to get ready and stay safe.

By being proactive and making preparedness a priority, people can protect themselves, their loved ones, and their communities, ensuring they are ready to respond effectively when disaster strikes.

NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS MONTH

Learn a Lifesaving Skill

Learning a lifesaving skill is an essential part of being prepared for emergencies, as it empowers individuals to act quickly and effectively when every second counts.

These skills can make the difference between life and death while waiting for professional responders to arrive.

Examples include:

- CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation), which can help restart a heart or keep blood flowing to vital organs during a cardiac emergency
- Basic first aid for treating wounds or burns
- AED (automated external defibrillator) use to restore a normal heart rhythm.

Gaining these skills boosts confidence and readiness, making individuals valuable assets in any crisis.

Build an Emergency Kit

An emergency kit is more than just a collection of supplies; it's your family's first line of defense when disaster strikes.

So its best to include the essentials to sustain your family throughout the disaster. This includes 1 gallon of water and non-perishable food per person per day (for at least 3 days), prescription medicines, and a first aid kit.

Of course, a kit is not all about staying safe, it should also be there to keep you and your family clean, comfortable, and healthy afterwards. Consider including items like blankets, card games, books, and toys for your pets!

Protect Important Documents

Keeping important documents safe and accessible during an emergency is vital for protecting your identity, finances, and ability to recover after the crisis.

Documents like identification cards, insurance policies, medical records, and property deeds are essential for accessing healthcare, filing insurance claims, and receiving aid. Storing these items in a waterproof, fireproof container or keeping digital copies in secure cloud storage ensures they remain intact and easily retrievable, even if your home is damaged.

By safeguarding these critical papers, you can reduce stress, expedite recovery, and maintain stability in the aftermath of a disaster.

Stay Informed

In an emergency, information is your best ally. Stay informed by signing up for local alerts, monitoring weather updates, and keeping an eye on news reports.

Knowing what's happening in real-time allows you to make quick, informed decisions to protect your family. Don't wait—stay informed and stay safe!

Know Evacuation Routes

Knowing travel and evacuation routes during an emergency or disaster is crucial for ensuring a safe and swift escape from danger. In a crisis, roads may become congested or impassable, and having pre-planned routes can prevent confusion and delays.

Understanding alternative paths, including less-traveled roads or nearby shelters, increases your ability to act quickly, potentially saving lives. Familiarizing yourself with evacuation procedures not only helps protect you and your family but also reduces the strain on emergency services, allowing first responders to focus on those in the greatest need.

What does your organization provide?

The Great Rivers Council is home of the only Sinquefield Invention Campus at Lake of the Ozarks Scout Reservation, and the Scouting Adventure Center in Columbia, Missouri. Our Invention Campus provides access hi-tech equipment, computer lab, 3D printers, laser engravers, CNC routers, embroidery machines, Scan-n-Cut machines, welding, metalworking, skills and trades, and more.

While our Scouting Adventure Center boasts Veterans United Foundation Climbing Wall and The Sinquefield Innovation Space. The Scouting Adventure Center is proud to be one of just two facilities in the Columbia area that will have access to a full-scale, indoor climbing wall. The wall is 26 ft high and approximately 40 ft wide. The highest point of the wall is Hillard's Peak! The wall will feature both automatic and traditional style belays.

The Sinquefield Innovation Space features 4 unique program areas, each with a different focus: Audio, Visual & Design, Engineering & Programming, Health & Safety, and Science & Nature. Throughout the year, Great Rivers Council runs various programs for youth from Drones, STEM programs, Coding and much more. We believe that with the right inspiration, motivation, and access, every person can be an innovator, creator, designer, and a maker of a better future.

What are some challenges you face?

The biggest challenge we face is getting people to know what we have to offer. Especially, programs that are open to anyone not just scouts. We believe everyone is a potential scout so we want everyone to have the opportunity to experience the things we can offer.
