
The leaves are changing color, the weather is getting cooler, and winter is right around the corner, and it is still important to stay informed and prepared for road closures, thunderstorms, early winter weather, and everything in between. Keep reading to find important information as well as see what we've been working on to keep our community prepared!

## Be aware of road closures and delays

Road construction happens year-round but is especially important in this season. I-70 and US 63 are two of the most important roads in the county, and right now they are both under construction as part of the Interstate 70 improvement project. Here are a few things you should be aware of:

### 1. Construction causes congestion

In parts of I-70, the speed limit slows down to much lower than the 70-mph standard you are used to. This means a lot of people are slowing down, causing congestion. Plan to avoid peak travel times to minimize delays.



### 2. Weather makes it worse

Add a storm or winter weather on top of everything else that is happening, and you have a real recipe for delays or crashes. Check weather conditions before you leave the house and prepare accordingly.



### 3. Phones down, Eyes up

And, most importantly, leave the phone in your pocket.

Being distracted can be dangerous for you, for others, and for road workers. To stay safe, leave the phone down and keep your eyes up

## Winter Preparedness

Winter is right around the corner, and there are several things that you should do if you want to be ready for the cold season. From clothing to car to home, lets prepare you to be safe in the upcoming weather.

#### **CLOTHES**

Your clothes are your first line of defense against the cold. Layering is key, starting with a moisture-wicking base layer. The middle layer should provide insulation, and the outer layer must be waterproof to protect against sleet and snow. Keep extra essentials like gloves and a hat in both your car and home emergency kits.



### **CAR**

A winter emergency kit is crucial for your car. It should contain a flashlight, shovel, and sand or cat litter for traction. Also, pack a first-aid kit, water, and warm blankets. Before winter, get your vehicle checked to ensure the battery and tires are ready for cold and icy conditions.

### **HOME**

A power outage can be a major challenge during a winter storm. Your home emergency kit should have a three-day supply of water and non-perishable food. Include a hand-crank radio, flashlights, and extra batteries. Have a backup heat source too.

## What steps has MODOT taken to ensure safety for commuters?

Project inspectors and engineers monitor the work daily, making adjustments like adding signs or pavement markings, or even redesigning an area if needed. Lane closures and reduced speed limits are used only when necessary to protect workers and the public, and the most impactful work is scheduled for overnight when traffic is low. The project also avoids major weekend events like Mizzou football games.

### What are challenges to that goal?

A primary challenge is the increase in traffic volume, speed, and distracted driving on I-70. With around 60,000 vehicles per day, there have been several near-misses with workers. MoDOT urges drivers to slow down and stay alert.

## What are some preventative measures that are taken to mitigate the risk of severe crashes, bottlenecks, etc.?

MoDOT uses advanced outreach and signage to inform the public of upcoming changes. To combat unexpected issues like crashes, they use "smart work zones" with message boards that automatically adjust for slow traffic, which has been shown to reduce secondary crashes. The Traffic Management Centers also monitor I-70 24/7 to help clear unexpected delays quickly in coordination with first responders.

## Is there anything else you want the community to know?

Columbia to Kingdom City is one of the largest projects in the history of MoDOT and Missouri. While the construction impacts can be frustrating, the long-term benefits will be significant. This project will be a game changer for improving the safety for the area and help with economic development.
